Reflection

Over the past couple of weeks, late in the afternoon, I have had the pleasure of sitting in my office in Olds, looking out those wonderful big windows, and watching all kinds of birds. Several magpies; lots and lots of robins, and this week, many flickers (those small, colourful woodpeckers).

All of them were busy, busy birds – consuming whatever delicacies they were finding in the lawn. Filling up their little bodies, preparing for the long winter ahead. (Hopefully not too long.) I did find myself wondering, the day I saw all the robins, why they were still in our part of the world, and why they hadn't headed south.

I was worried about those little robins, and whether they would get further south before the weather turns, before the snows come. Yes – I was worried...but were the birds? It sure didn't look like it. Those little birds just seemed so very content...happy in the abundant offering that the lawn had set before them.

Why was I so worried? Why couldn't I trust that those wonderful little creatures that are often the first ones to let us know that spring has arrived would also know when winter is coming? Why couldn't I trust the rhythms of God's creation?

That moment of worry took away from the moments of joy in watching those little birds hopping around the lawn enjoying a late lunch. And could my worry about those little birds change anything – for them or for me?

“²⁶Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are you not of more value than they? ²⁷And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?”

Those are some of the words taken from the NRS bible version of the story I shared earlier during Children's Time. The birds, the beautiful lilies in the garden that don't worry about how they are clothed.

How many of you worry about what you wear? About how you are going to look when you go out each day?

Then there's some of the other little things we worry about. Will there be enough food on the table for our thanksgiving feast? Will our guests all get along?

These days, one wonders – and let's be honest – we worry - if the guests will get into an argument over vaccinations or masks; or politics – especially given that we've been on election mode for most of the fall – both federal and municipal. It does make me sad to see how COVID has become politicized, and how it has created conflict among friends and family – those vaccinated and those not; those who mask and those who don't; those who follow restrictions and those who don't.

Do I worry about that? You bet I do.

²⁷And can any of you by worrying add a single hour to your span of life?"

No, we can't. And in fact, science and medical research have proven that worry can actually take hours off of our lives.

What can I do with my worry? I can give it to God. I can pray about those worries. And I can also take action myself. I can do my best to be kind and compassionate in all my relationships – with those who think like me, and with those who don't. For at the end of the day, isn't that what Jesus would do?

Wouldn't he sit down and have a meal with someone who thought differently than he did, and talk it out, or tell a story. Wouldn't he love them, as strongly as ever he could?

As followers of his way, how might we meet those moments of worry, or conflict, and find the joy in life?

We are in the season of giving thanks. What about if we sought out opportunities to name our gratitudes for each person we encountered...to them. What if we took a moment out of each encounter to look for the good, the positive, to say things like "I appreciate you, and how you did this." Or "Thank you for sharing your time."

Perhaps write a note, or an email, or a text.

Or do something kind for another. Practice small acts of kindness. Show your care and compassion. Do your part to let people know that God loves them more than the little birds, more than the lilies of the field.

I spoke a few weeks ago about the reality that people will trust us more by how we act, by what we do than by what we say.

Give gratitude. Live gratitude. Give thanks, Live thanks. Take the abundant love that you have received from God, and let the world know that it is that love that is the source of peace, hope and joy. And let the world know that God's love is there for them, too.

I do want to share something with you that ties in to what we worry about, what we value, and where we find moments of joy and gratitude. I'm not often one to share stories from the internet – but this one fits...author unknown...

One day a very wealthy father took his son on a trip to the country for the sole purpose of showing his son how it was to be poor. They spent a few days and nights on the farm of what would be considered a very poor family.

After their return from the trip, the father asked his son how he liked the trip. "It was great, Dad," the son replied. "Did you see how poor people can be?" the father asked. "Oh Yeah," said the son.

"So what did you learn from the trip?" asked the father. The son answered, "I saw that we have one dog and they had four. We have a pool that reaches to the middle of our garden and they have a creek that has no end. We have imported lanterns in our garden and they have the stars at night. Our patio reaches to the front yard and they have the whole horizon.

We have a small piece of land to live on and they have fields that go beyond our sight. We have servants who serve us, but they serve others.

We buy our food, but they grow theirs. We have walls around our property to protect us, they have friends to protect them." The boy's father was speechless. Then his son added, "It showed me just how poor we really are."

Too many times we forget what we have and concentrate on what we don't have. What is one person's worthless object is another's prize possession. It is all based on one's perspective.

Sometimes it takes the perspective of a child to remind us what's important.

This Week's Minute for Mission

"Dignity is on the Menu"

Most of us appreciate a well-dressed table and can afford to go out for dinner from time to time. Many of us will be sitting down to elaborate Thanksgiving dinners. Our daily experience doesn't involve standing in line for every single meal with a tray in hand.

That's why special dinners like Café Cinq-Zéro-Sept that Ottawa-based Mission & Service partner Centre 507 hosts are so important. Several times a year, the adult drop-in centre sets up a small room for a special fine-dining meal with gourmet food, decorations, and candlelight. For just two dollars, participants have their choice of meal accompanied by full service and great company.



“We realized that people in our community struggling with poverty had to wait in line a long time for a meal. When they were served, they weren’t given any choice and felt pressured to leave so that the next person could be served. That’s why we started Café Cinq-Zéro-Sept,” says Richard LeBlanc, Centre 507’s Executive Director. “We saw such a change in how people felt about themselves after experiencing this kind of a meal that our ultimate goal is that this dining experience becomes the norm rather than the exception.”

While COVID-19 has been challenging, it has also helped the drop-in take an important step toward achieving their goal. “One of the great things that happened is that when COVID hit, we had to start a system where everyone sat down and was served,” says LeBlanc.

Centre 507 now serves 25 people at sit-down meals and provides 150 people with meals to go each day. The café has incorporated a training program where participants learn to be servers, too. “We are taking the next step toward achieving our goal. We aren’t going back to line-ups after the pandemic,” vows LeBlanc.
